Three professional organisations were allocated time to present their work related to community safety and answer questions too. This created an interactive and informative discussion on safety initiatives in Sutton.

# **NEW: Celebrating Sutton's Diversity Project**

# **Sutton Safety Survey Update**

The Sutton Safety Survey, led by Sutton Grammar School's Student Voice, and one of the Young Commissioners, Joseph Dean, was conducted earlier this year in response to growing concerns about safety, particularly following recent incidents of knife violence. The survey aimed to understand students' perceptions of safety within the borough. Below are some of the initial key findings from the survey:

47%

of young people are concerned that knife violence might directly affect them.

82%

of students are aware of safetydisrupting incidents, yet many still rate Sutton 7/8 out of 10 for safety. Nearly

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of all respondents have witnessed unsafe situations on social media, suggesting a link between online content and local

violence.

400

students are unsure how to stay safe, and 80% believe more safety measures are needed in Sutton.

of respondents have witnessed or been victims of incidents in Sutton, with nearly 250 experiencing serious crime more

# Introductions: Key Organisations Supporting Safety in Sutton

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## Organisation 1:

Patricia and her team Successful Sutton: Enhancing Town Centre Safety



Patricia Park, Chief Executive of Successful Sutton, provided a detailed overview of the organisation's role as a Business Improvement District (BID). With 487 member businesses ranging from high street retailers to commercial companies, Successful Sutton collaborates with local authorities and the police to enhance safety in the town centre.

### **Key Initiatives Discussed:**

- BID Radio Scheme: A communication network connecting 87 businesses with Sutton Police, Sutton Street Pastors, and key shopping centers like St Nicholas and Times Square. The scheme is vital for addressing issues such as pickpocketing, shoplifting, and anti-social behavior in real-time.
- Patrolling and Security: BID support officers, patrol the high street from Monday to Saturday, providing an on-the-ground presence to deter crime and assist in reporting incidents and accessing CCTV footage.
- Collaboration with Safety Organisations: Successful Sutton works closely with organisations like Sutton Women's Centre and Reclaim the Streets to gather data on areas where individuals feel unsafe. This information is used to improve lighting, address poorly lit alleys, and enhance overall safety.
- Community Perception: Patricia emphasised that while Sutton remains a low-crime area, the visibility of the high street means that incidents are highly noticeable. The collaboration with various stakeholders ensures a coordinated approach to safety, benefiting businesses, residents, and visitors alike.

### Q: Has Sutton become more unsafe?

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**Q:** Has petty crime increased?

SUCCESS SUTTO IL FOR A BUSINESS IMPROVEM **A:** Patricia clarified that the perceived increase in incidents is due to population growth and greater public transport links bringing more people into the area. However, Sutton remains a safe borough.

**A:** Patricia acknowledged an increase in shoplifting, linked to the cost of living crisis, with many incidents involving theft of necessities like food and nappies. Businesses are experiencing higher overhead costs, leading to reduced staffing and increased vulnerability to theft. Successful Sutton works with the Council to provide support and referrals for those in need.



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## **Organisation 2:**

**Mark and Caroline** 

Street Pastors: Community-Based Safety Support



Mark and Caroline, representing Sutton Street Pastors, shared insights into their role in providing both practical and emotional support to the community. As part of Sutton Community Works, Street Pastors operate as volunteers from 20 local churches, offering a visible presence and support to vulnerable individuals.

### **Key Responsibilities:**

- Patrol Operations: Street Pastors patrol Sutton and Wallington during weekend afternoons and evenings, providing a reassuring presence, particularly for young people. Their work includes offering water, flip-flops, first aid, safety alarms, and even arranging safe transportation for those in need.
- · Safety Advice: The team provides practical safety tips, such as staying in pairs, avoiding distractions from phones, and having an exit strategy when in potentially unsafe situations. Partnerships: Street Pastors partner with the police, the council, and the Sutton Safer
- Partnership, ensuring a coordinated approach to safety and community support.

Q: How do you support the homeless?



**A:** The Street Pastors' approach to homelessness involves signposting individuals to support services rather than giving money directly, though they do provide snacks and hot drinks.

# Q: How does your volunteer recruitment work?



A: The team recruits volunteers from church congregations, with a preference for younger individuals, though they have noted challenges in attracting this demographic. Being Christian is a prerequisite for joining.



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# **Organisation 3:**



# Metropolitan Police Youth Engagement & Diversion Team Sutton: Youth Engagement and Safety

PC 3182 Hamilton SN BCU, Youth Engagement Officer, alongside his colleague PC 2591 Cunningham SN BCU, discussed the police's efforts to maintain safety in Sutton, particularly among young people. The officers emphasized the importance of early intervention and youth engagement to prevent crime.

- Key Points:
- Youth Engagement Initiatives: The police are involved in various programs targeting vulnerable young people, including sports activities and workshops aimed at diverting them from crime and exploitation. They highlighted the recent success in securing funding for a knife crime project, which uses Virtual Reality experiences to educate children as young as 10 years old about the dangers of gang culture.
- Police Presence: He encouraged young people to approach the police with any concerns when they see officers patrolling the high street. He also promoted the Streetsafe app, which allows residents to report areas where they feel unsafe, with the data being monitored by the police.
- Crime Levels in Sutton: Sutton continues to be one of the safest boroughs in London, with significantly lower crime rates compared to neighbouring areas like Croydon. However, the police are facing challenges in recruitment, with more officers leaving than being recruited.

Q: What measures are you taking to try and prevent knife crime?

**A:** They stressed the need to start educating children at a younger age, as current initiatives often target individuals too late. The new approach, focusing on early intervention, aims to have a long-term impact on reducing knife crime.



Q: How are you promoting Police work?

**A:** They acknowledged the need to better communicate the positive work being done by the police in Sutton, particularly in youth engagement and crime prevention. Also the collaboration with the police and Young Commissioners creating a newsletter.
